His cinematic brilliance lies in creating sophisticated expressions of time and space where often reality and fantasy are deliberately fused together in a complex narrative. To honour this legacy, the auteur has been honoured with the prestigious Satyajit Ray Lifetime Achievement award at the gala IFFI opening today. His daughter Anna Saura accepted the award on his behalf.


#IFFIWaves
