A Toast to Reading and Boundless Imagination

Learning is a continuous process necessary to become the master of any craft. Observing life and paying attention to one's surroundings is a must to power the quest to fulfil one's aspirations.

These were some insightful thoughts shared by IFFI 53 Masterclass guest Pankaj Tripathi, who is well-known among cine buffs as an actor who simply lives every character he plays.

Loved also for his down-to-earth personality, Tripathi narrated, there was a gap of eight years between his first two movies. Even during that phase, he never got bogged down by the uncertainties life had to offer. He utilised that time to evolve and add material to his craft, by living and breathing his passion for acting.

Emphasising how it is reading rather than watching movies that helps him learn, the actor who brought to life iconic characters like Sultan Qureshi from Gangs of Wasseypur said: "Visuals fix references, but reading opens up the imagination. I like to read on varied subjects including history and psychology. This helps me understand myself with renewed clarity."

The actor said that there is more to acting than just showing emotions. "Acting is equally about showing and hiding emotion. Economy of gesture is important."

Dissecting the layers of character development and the multifarious aspects that come into play while portraying a character, Tripathi, who changed the definition of stardom, explained: "Beyond black and white, portraying grey is the real challenge, since these traits are not visible to all."

He says films are becoming a tool for him to become a better person. "The relation between an actor and the character is always relevant. You become a better person by playing various characters, by accepting the best and rejecting the worst traits of the characters."

Talk about running into mind-blowing trivia. In the year 1981 too, I paid tribute to renowned Spanish filmmaker Carlos Saura, who happens to be the recipient of Satyajit Ray Lifetime Achievement Award at the ongoing 53rd IFFI. Read our archive for more details on his works.





The film builds a powerful story through the silence displayed by a marginalized tribal man accused of murdering his wife. Om Puri and Naseeruddin Shah's power-packed performances leave the audience spellbound while watching the film and provide much food for thought on the society we live in. This style of 'art' film making soon became a signature of filmmaker Govind Nihalani who later went on to make movies such as *Ardh Satya* (1983), *Party* (1984) and *Drohkaal* (1994).

Here are some other notable mentions from Indian Panorama at my 8th edition, IFFI '81.

CARLOS SAURA

After Luis Bunuel, Carlos Saura is the most brilliant and highly acclaimed filmmaker to come out of Spain. Yet, only one of his thirteen features has been seen in India so far. Cousin Angelica (La Prima Angelica) was screened in the Sixth International Film Festival of India when Saura himself attended the festival. This year Saura cannot come, but the festival has managed to get seven features by him to provide an over view of a work which can be said to trace "the political development of Individual consciousness".
