



Dr Kalyan Kumar Chakravarty is a distinguished art historian and administrator who has combined governance with cultural leadership for over five decades. He has served as Chairman, Lalit Kala Akademi; Director General, National Museum; Member Secretary, IGNCA; Director, Indira Gandhi Rashtriya Manav Sangrahalaya; Chancellor, NUEPA; and Commissioner/Secretary for Culture, Environment, Education, and Tourism in Madhya Pradesh and Chhattisgarh. He has also led Bhasha Trust, People's Council of Education, and the Delhi Institute of Heritage Research and Management, among others.

Prof. Naman P. Ahuja is a curator and Professor at Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi, specializing in art history. He is also the General Editor of Marg. His studies on ancient terracotta and small everyday objects examine the foundations of Indian visual aesthetics. His publications and curatorial projects—The Body in Indian Art, The Making of the Modern Indian Artist Craftsman, Gandhara: A Confluence of Cultures, and India & the World, to name a few—have drawn attention to Indian iconography, trans culturalism in antiquity and the historiography of the Arts and Crafts Movement.

Abstract

The Origin of Another Buddha Image

Recent discoveries of images of bodhisattvas and perhaps even Siddhartha in ancient terracotta and ivories show them in styles and forms that are completely different from the well-known Mathura, Gandhara or Amaravati types. Accommodating them into the longstanding history of the origin and early development of the image of the Buddha forces a wider acknowledgement of the forces that encourage the shift toward theistic worship in Ancient India as well as moving beyond the false binaries between aniconism and anthropomorphic worship. This lecture builds on the fundamental postulates on these matters as laid down by Coomaraswamy by adding elements from this new corpus of images alongside more current research on the religious history of the period.
