- 7. Challenges

- 50K HEI Majority Single program with less than 100 students commercial enterprises (Quality?)
- Rigid separation of disciplines, Early specialisation and streaming of students into narrow areas of study
- A lack of access to higher education, especially in socio-economically disadvantaged areas;
- A lack of teacher and institutional autonomy to innovate and excel
- Inadequate mechanisms for merit- based career management and progression of faculty and institutional leaders
- A lack of research at most universities and colleges, and of transparent and competitive peer-reviewed research funding across disciplines
- Suboptimal governance and leadership of HEIs
- A regulatory system that is not empowered to close down fake colleges, while constraining excellent and innovative institutions.
